Nicolette Mowry also dropped over a second in her 200 free swim, moving from 28th (2:05.41) to 20th place with a 2:03.77. Also competing in the 500 freestyle, Mowry, seeded 27th with a 5:37.93, worked a 5:34.26 and placed 26th overall.

The three girls, along with Lauren Longenecker, joined forces in the 400 free relay. The 17th seed (3:51.86) posted their best time, 3:55.05, and moved into 15th place.

Regional Volkssport Conference Welcomes Local Walkers

Rain, shine, or - heaven help us snow, the attendees of the seventh biennial Atlantic Region Conference of the American Volkssport Association will hit the pavement on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, March 14, 15, and 16. The conference, which is sponsored by the Keystone State Volkssport Association (KSVA), will be held at the Lancaster Host Resort, 2300 Lincoln Highway East,

The public is invited to join conference attendees on featured walks each day of the event. Check-in for all the ventures will be held at the rear of the Host, and then participants will drive to the starting locations for the walks. Water and hard candy will be offered at checkpoints on the walks, and restrooms will be available as well.

Registration for Friday's featured walk, "Shop "Til You Drop," will be offered from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Two trails - 5K or 10K - will take pedestrians on strolls through Rockvale and Tanger outlets, as well as past neighboring farms. Saturday's feature, with registration from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m., will begin at the Strasburg Rail Road. Participants may choose between 6K and 10K trails that will take them past the Museum Railroad Pennsylvania and through the village of Strasburg. Registration for Sunday's walk will be open from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Participants will drive to the East Lampeter Township Community Park, from which they will walk past several apartment complexes, the Amish Farm and House complex, the Willow Hill covered bridge, and the American Music Theatre on 5K and 10K trails.

If you are noticing a theme among the walks, it is because the planners designed the event to take advantage of the cultural diversity in eastern Lancaster County.

"You've got to tell a story (to prospective out-of-town attendees): why do you want to drive two hours to go walk?" KSVA president Tom Jackson explained. "They've seen the Amish 'reality' shows. Now they want to see how much is real, how much is fake."

Jackson described the varied zoning as the "dichotomy of Lancaster County," with Amish
